COMPREHENSIVE PRESENTATION OF MIFACIG TRAINING AND RESOURCE CENTRE

Introduction

The creation of MIFACIG were spurred by living conditions in their area, where there was poverty and threats of food insufficiency. Soil

fertility was lower than in other parts of the Region and this was made worse by poor agricultural practices. There was rapid loss of natural forests through unsustainable exploitation of medicinal plants, Non Timber Forest Products, fuel wood and Timber. At the same time, existing fruit trees in the area were of very low yield and quality. The promoters of MIFACIG were also inspired by the activities of a conservationist project Known as the Ijim-Kiloum Mountain project which was putting in much effort in the maintenance of the biodiversity in the neighbouring forest reserves. It is thus on the bases of this that MIFACIG was created.

1, Creation and Registration.

MIFACIG stands for Twangtoh Mixed Farming Common Initiative Group. It was created in 1993 and registered in 1995 with the Registrar of Cooperatives and Common Initiative Groups, as a Common Initiative Group (CIG) It has as registration number: NW/GP/01/95/777 on the law n°92/000 of 01/07/1992 and implementation degree n°92/455/PM of 23/12/92. MIFACIG is rnon profit-oriented, non denominational and apolitical

2. Location and area of jurisdiction

The Head Office of MIFACIG was located at at Njinikejem-Belo subdivision, Boyo Division, where it operates as a community based indigenous, common initiative group. It is located on about 3 ha of land where it has now developed the MIFACIG Training and Resource Centre. Recently, 10 ha of land has been acquired in Kedjom Keku to where the training and Resource Cantre shall extend. MIFACIG's initial area of jurisdiction and coverage was Boyo Division. Boyo falls within the Ijim mountain forest. The Ijim forest is a very vulnerable forest and its resources have been over-exploited in the past. Now, local farmers have realized the importance of protecting its natural biodiversity in order to protect very valuable endemic species and to keep the ecosystem safe for flora and fauna (Tauraco bannerman, Platysteira liticincta). The forest is also the watershed for the valley: therefore protecting its vegetative layer is a major issue for farmers of the Belodivision, Boyo Division. Today, it has stretched beyond to other parts of the North West Region and the country'

3. Mission

The mission of MIFACIG is to support the development of agroforestry by providing trainings and thus its mission statement is "sharing trees and plants that serve life" thus, a link between the community and natural resources.

The vision is to **alleviate poverty** through the **sustainable management of natural resources** in rural area. This involves training youths, Women, vulnerable groups to produce valuable planting material and increase food production in their farms, watersheds community forests, while encouraging sustainable horticulture, apiary development and environmental protection.

4. The MIFACIG Training and Resource Centre.

MIFACIG has grown in capacity and activities, and this has resulted into the development of a full Training and Resource Centre. This is justified by the improved training resources put in place including infrastructure and equipment. To further strenghten the status of MIFACIG a Training and Resource Centre, the nursery was improved upon and mordern nursery activities added, as well as other Trial and Demonstration facilities were added.

5. Main goals

The target goals of the MIFACIG Training and Resource Centre are

- Improved livelihoods for local communities
- Sustainable forest exploitation and appropriate afforestation
- Maintenance of the biodiversity.

In the case of improved livelihoods, the MIFACIG Training and Resource Centre carries out the following training, trial and demonstration activities:

- ➤ Tree domestication and agroforestry;
- ➤ Propagation of Non Timber Forest Products;
- > Bee keeping and honey production, apiary management;
- ➤ Rapid multiplication of plantain suckers;
- ➤ Kolanut production;
- > Organic gardening and medical plants cultivation.
- > Small Livestock Units.

- > Training on integration of Agroforestry practices in coffee production
- ➤ Soil Fertility;
- > Nursery management;
- ➤ Marketing and marketing strategies
- ➤ Group dynamics, conflict resolution and all group management aspects.

For sustainable Forest Exploitation, MIFACIG Training and Resource Centre provides theoretical and practical raining on Timber products and Non Timber Forest Products. This is followed by awareness raising on the importance of the forest and the absolute need to preserve and restore it. This will be accompanied by training on sustainable exploitation of Non timber Forest Products.

Forest preservation is expected from improved livelihoods for local communities which provides alternatives to interfearance with the forest, and sustainable forest exploitation and appropriate afforestation. Forest preservation equally protects wild life, their sources of nourishment and their habitat. The maintenance of biodiversity is thus guaranteed.

6. Targets

6.1. Employment

MIFACIG Training and Resource Centre provides new skills: as qualified people are scarce and training them is a wealth for the communities.

6.2. Empowerment of farmers

While mastering the techniques of domestication, farmers and youths are able to develop their own nurseries, gardens, orchards and the modern bee-keeping techniques and the transformation of by-products are very lucrative knowledge.

Therefore thanks to the diversification of the productions and the increase of yields, the farmers are able to increase their household income. But among everything this knowledge is a great tool for them to get more aware of all the opportunities they have: illiterates represent 70 % of the rural population and without training; no hope of change is possible in rural area (*UNDP*).

3. Reducing the pressure on environmental resources

The forest of Ijim and Kilum are very vulnerable and without any protection, its disappearance would be fatal according to the human pressure. This protection has allowed its area to witness an increase of 7,8% in the 1988-2005 period while it has been reduced of 50% between 1958 and 1988 (*Botanic Garden*, *London – Birdlife International*, 2001).

MIFACIG is working in that way and the domestication of endemic species (like *Prunus Africana*) helps to reduce human pressure on the forest; agroforestry practices and tree domestication help people to earn a better living from the land they have outside the forest, and thus avoid opening of new farmland at the expense of forestland. Thus they avoid destroying the country's largest watershed and animal habitats of vulnerable species: especially birds as *bannerman's Tauraco, Platysteiraliticincta* (source: Birdlife International)

Besides, tree domestication encourages farmers and youths to plant more trees, and thus protects the watershed, combats soil erosion and increases the fertility of soils. Thanks to fertilizer trees such as Caliandra or Acacia, very efficient new agricultural techniques can be developed.

6.4. Promote food security and production of food locally consumed

The innovative domestication techniques make crop yields and quality better. Moreover with fruit trees cultivation in mixed farms, transformation in juice or adapted post harvest preservation techniques, more food would be available on the market and this effort has to be done in order to feed the increasing population of Cameroon.

7: Objectives

The key objective of MIFACIG **is** to develop local capacity in carrying out self-help initiatives for the wellbeing of rural population while protecting and improving on environmental values.

This objectives comprise of:

the empowerment of rural people to extricate them from the unprivileged situation of poverty;

- the promotion of the production of improved fruit trees and domestication of endangered trees species;
- the promotion of the production of medicinal plants that can be used to improve low cost but effective medication, or sold off for income;
- the promotion of modern agroforestry practices and conservation farming aimed at soil and water conservation, to ensure food sufficiency;
- the reduction of the tension on wood and non-wood forests products resources;
- ❖ the conservation of biodiversity through the reduction of interference in natural forest, and thus reducing the destruction of animal life, sources of nourishment and habitat;
- the promotion of non-plant activities that contribute towards the reduction of pressure on the natural forests such as honey production and small livestock productction.

7. Activities and services that MIFACIG offers

The MIFACIG training and Resource Centre offers services of Sensitisation, Training, provision of materials, marketing, follow up and coordination of stake holders involved in preservation and afforestation, and maintenance of the biodiversity. These services are in the following domains:

Tree domestication. This involves using a rapid vegetative method of tree multiplication which aims at maintaining fruit quality and which brings about early fructification. There are different techniques which include: bud grafting, marcotts and rooting of leafy cuttings. Tree domestication is quite appropriate for fruit trees. The MIFACIG Training and Resource Centre has equally applied this on medicinal trees and trees that produce Non Timber Forest Products which are now domesticated and planted in gardens, orchards or private forests. Human pressure on the trees in their natural habitat will thus be reduced and endangered species protected and revived.

Modern apiary development. This is a complementary rural activity to tree cultivation. The various plants produce flowers which attract bees for nectar and the bees in turn carry out their role in pollination. Unsustainable bee hunting is one of principal causes of forest destruction as the honey hunters use fire and methods which destroy trees and vegetation. Providing sensitisation and training on sustainable methods

of honey exploitation within the forest puts reduces forest destruction and consequent loss of habitat to fauna. Further trainings on modern beekeeping techniques away from the natural forests guarantees production of better quality honey than obtained with the use of local techniques of bee-keeping. Production of good quality honey provides potential income generating activities to community members and resultant ample incomes. It also reduces pressure on the natural forest by honey hunters.

Organic gardening and medicinal plants cultivation. This involves soil conservation, composting and other methods to maintain or improve soils. This is accompanied by improved methods for gardens and orchards in a bid to enable farmers to improve the food production in their garden with the use of organic manure and restore the soil fertility thanks to agroforestry techniques integration.

Marketing. This is the ability of farmers to empower their business and comprises of topics such as: evaluation of prices, bargaining, market strength, standardisation, grading of products, and understanding the opportunities and the threats on the market.

Group dynamics. This consist of precious knowledge to lead and manage groups and to solve conflicts within different partners. A lot of farmers have very interesting self-initiatives but are not strong enough to face common difficulties faced by groups.

During the UN conference on Environment and Development in Rio Earth Summit (1992), Cameroon presented a report on the state of its environmental balance in Cameroon, highlighting the adverse effect of increasing poverty with its advert effects on forest resources and other natural resources. A National Action Plan was developed according to Agenda 21 from the Rio Earth Summit. MIFACIG Training and Resource Centre is committed to working in accordance with this action plan, given that it falls in line with the objectives and activities of the organization.

8. Management and organisation

The General Assembly:

MIFACIG has a membership of 39 persons who equally constitute the main working force of the organization. These together form the General

Assembly which is the highest decision making body. It is presided by the chairperson of the Centre who summons a meeting when considered necessary.

The Executive Bureau:

Executive Bureau serves as an organ of control and moderation. Elected by the General Assembly, it is given the task of **day to day management** of the activities of the resource Centre. They thus represent the management staff of the Centre

The **chairperson** of the Executive Bureau equally serves as Coordinator. He ensures proper Management of the Centre, represents the Centre where necessary and reports back to the Executive Bureau and General Assembly.

The **Secretary General** takes minutes during meetings, keeps all records and assists the chairperson in the administration and coordination of MIFACIG.

The **Financial Secretary** and the treasurer manage the financial department, keep all financial records. They are required to have the competence of an accountant to back them up.

One of the members of the Executive Bureau with special competences will head the production section. Proceeds from production provide funding for maintenance and up keep of the MIFACIG

Training and Resource Centre.

Another member of the Executive Committee with the required qualification and experience heads the Training Section. He is thus responsible for handling a team of trainers including experts on part time.

The Staff:

The **co-ordinator** is the head of the staff. He is responsible of the effectiveness of the Executive Bureau's strategies and decisions. But he also acts as a General Manager and the Public Relation Officer. It is obvious that one person is not enough for all these responsibilities and tasks.

The **production officer** is in charge of the elaboration of the planting schedule and the supply of planting and livestock material. He has the

responsibility of the good run of the nursery, the garden, the piggery and the apiary.

The **training officer** is in charge of the day to day trainings' organisation. He is responsible of the efficiency and good participation of MIFAGIC trainers and facilitators.

The other members shall constitute technical staff and trainers. MIFACIG also hires some staff from outside. These serve as farm attendants, in the finance department, as cateres for the facility.

It is a pleasure for me to recommend the Twantoh Mixed Farmer Common Initiative Group (MIFACIG) to your institution for funding. I first came in contact with the grass root organisation MIFACIG in 1998. In fact, ICRAF, in partnership with MIFACIG, has implemented a number of agroforestry and other sustainable development projects in the Northwest region of Cameroon. For example, MIFACIG was chosen by ICRAF as a 'relay organisation' to facilitate the extension of agroforestry technologies to hundreds of farmers within its network of 41 farmer organisations in the Boyo division of Cameroon. With backstopping from ICRAF, MIFACIG has now grown from a relay organisation for the transfer of agroforestry technologies to farmers to a model 'rural resource centre' that also trains extension agents, and serves as a learning hub for agroforestry students at both the undergraduate and graduate level.




